Other News and What's New	
Grants Awards:	Currently have a \$95 million Call for Projects open– Applications due August 22, 2014. Awarded \$111.5 million in grants in November 2013.
Arterial Preservation Program:	The Arterial Preservation Program (APP) is funded from the Highway Safety Account. TIB does not expect to receive Highway Safety account funding in the future due to other state transportation budget pressures. Future APP programs are dependent upon budget appropriation.
Small City Grant Programs:	New emphasis on lower cost rehabilitation (pavement recycling, base augmentation). Eliminating TIB program bias toward reconstruction. Reconstruction only funded when specifically justified. Additionally, TIB is taking a holistic look at small city programs and expect to announce changes early 2015.
LED Streetlight Program:	LED Streetlight Pilot Program is complete. TIB is asking the legislature to establish an ongoing program with funds from the Highway Safety Account.
Urban Program Selection Criteria:	Selection criteria adopted in 2013 rates urban projects four ways, based on Safety, Growth & Development, Mobility and Physical Condition factors. Additionally, all projects receive a score for Sustainability and Constructability.
Coordination:	All non-TIB funds are recognized as match. Agencies may coordinate project funding. TIB provides match for federally funded projects.


Department of Health - DWSRF

Program:	Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF)
Eligible Applicants:	Community and non-community water systems (includes for-profit and non-profit systems, but not federal or state-owned systems); both privately- and publicly-owned (cities, counties, special purpose districts) systems are eligible
Eligible Projects:	Drinking water infrastructure projects aimed at increasing public health protection
Loan/Grant:	Loan (Federal funds); a limited amount of subsidy is available for communities with high affordability index rates and consolidation projects \$6M per jurisdiction per year; \$12M for jointly-owned projects 1.0 – 1.5% interest rate 20 year repayment 1% loan fee assessed at contract execution
Match:	None required
Timeline:	Apply: September 2014 (annual funding cycle) Awarded: after Public Works Approval (no legislative approval)

What's New

What's New: Funding Cycle	The DWSRF program has returned to the fall application cycle. There seems to be a better bidding climate for clients in the winter and we can work with the other funders to help use all of our money more effectively.
What's New: Status of Funds	Nationwide, DWSRF programs are receiving reduced amounts of funding; the capital grants may cease in federal fiscal year 2017
What's new: January 2015	Another round of Small System Preconstruction Grants will be available. We will have approximately \$300K available.

Eligible Applicants:	Cities, towns, counties, and special purpose districts
Eligible Projects:	High-priority drinking water source protection projects identified in a plan and supported by Office of Drinking Water regional office. Eligible projects include: feasibility studies, hydrogeologic studies, land acquisition and conservation easements, watershed protection best management practices, and source water protection planning.
Loan/Grant:	Grant (Drinking Water State Revolving Fund set-asides)
Grants/Applications Due:	No deadline – funds awarded on first come, first served basis according to regional source water protection priorities


Department of Ecology

Program:	Integrated Water Quality Funding Program (includes Clean Water State Revolving Fund Loans, Centennial Clean Water Grants, Clean Water Act Section 319 Grants, and Stormwater Financial Assistance Grants)
Eligible Applicants:	Generally any public body (county, city, town, special purpose district, quasi-municipal corporation, and federally-recognized Indian tribe). For SFY16, Stormwater Program grants are limited to cities and counties. Nonprofits are eligible to apply for Clean Water Act Section 319 grants.
Eligible Projects:	Any water quality improvement project (wastewater treatment and collection; stormwater collection and treatment; combined sewer overflow; low impact stormwater; septic system rehabilitation and repair; nonpoint source pollution projects, including riparian restoration)
Loan/Grant:	Most funds are provided as loans (mostly Federal funds). Forgivable principal loans are available in some cases. Grants (State funds) are available for certain project types (hardship wastewater construction projects, nonpoint source pollution projects, stormwater). Interest Rates: 2.4% for 5-20 year loans; 1.2% for 1-5 year loans
Match:	None required for loans or Centennial hardship grants. 25% match for Stormwater program grants (15% for hardship). 25% match for Centennial and Section 319 grants for nonpoint source pollution control projects.
Timeline:	Applications for FY16: Sept. 1 – Nov. 7, 2014 (annual funding cycle) Awards for FY16 applicants: July 2015 (no legislative approval)

<p>What's New: On-line Platform</p>	<p>This is the 2nd year for EAGL (Ecology Administration of Grants and Loans). EAGL is Ecology's on-line platform for funding applications, agreement development, progress reporting, and payment requests. Some new functions have been added, and some revisions to the application have been made.</p>
<p>What's New: Status of Funds</p>	<p>Loan funding levels return to a more normal level this year. The budget outlook is positive for grants for stormwater projects, nonpoint source pollution abatement projects, and to support wastewater projects in communities facing financial hardship.</p>

What's New: Status of Funds	The 2013-2015 Capital Budget includes selection, ranking, and submission process changes for the awarding of construction loan funds. These changes are listed in Section 7032 of Chapter 19, Laws of 2013. http://leap.leg.wa.gov/leap/budget/lbns/1315Cap5035-S.SL.pdf
What's New: 2014 Legislative Proviso 	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Interest rates at 60% of average daily market rate for tax-exempt municipal bonds with terms between 5 – 20 years.• Applicant jurisdiction must have adopted a Greenhouse Gas policy <u>prior to application due date</u>.• Applicants planning under Growth Management Act (GMA) must be in conformance <u>at time of contract execution</u>.• For drinking water and sanitary sewer projects, applicants <u>must first apply to the DOH and ECY</u> during their normal funding cycle. Only projects not selected for funding by DOH and ECY will be eligible for PWTF loan program.

Local Option Capital Asset Lending

Eligible Applicants:	Any municipality authorized to issue general obligation debt, to include: cities, counties, school districts, fire districts and others. <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Issuance of revenue obligation debt is not eligible• \$10,000 minimum for equipment, but various items can be combined to meet the minimum.
Eligible Projects:	Equipment or real estate, including but not limited to: School buses, ambulances, construction projects, fire trucks, HVAC systems, computers, office furniture, copiers, vacant land, portable classrooms, city hall, and energy projects.
Loan/Grant:	Loan (state funds)
Timeline:	Submit Notice of Intent and Credit Form by: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• For March funding: December 1st for real estate and equipment• For August funding: June 1st for real estate and equipment• Loan funds available late March; mid/late August

National Rural Water Association

Eligible Applicants:	Municipalities, counties, special purpose districts, Native American Tribes, nonprofit corporations (including cooperatives, with up to 10,000 people and rural areas with no population limits)
Eligible Projects:	Pre-development costs associated with proposed water and wastewater projects. Short-term costs of replacing equipment, small-scale extension of services or other small capital projects that are not part of regular operations and maintenance.
Loan/Grant:	Loan (Federal funds) 3% interest rate
Timeline:	Open year-round

Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds

Eligible Applicants:	Any authorized bond issuer may issue a QECB from the state allocation, or from a city or county allocation. Individual project developers will need to work with their local jurisdiction or a state issuer to arrange for the bond issuance.
Eligible Projects:	Energy conservation in government buildings, green communities programs, renewable energy in rural areas, research on energy conservation and renewable energy; reducing energy consumption and pollution from mass commuting facilities; demonstration projects to commercialize green technologies; public energy conservation education campaigns
Funding:	Federal funds from the U.S. Treasury in the form of either a tax credit for the bond investor or an interest rate subsidy for the bond issuer
Timeline:	Applications accepted year-round; however, most of the allocation has been used as of July 2014; contact Liz Green-Taylor for availability information

Bond Cap Allocation Program

Eligible Applicants:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Cities, counties, port districts, special purpose districts• Business or developers working with public authorities to develop projects to issue bonds
Eligible Projects:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Small-issue manufacturing• Affordable housing, both multifamily and single family• Exempt (capital) facilities -- includes some types of infrastructure projects under special conditions• Student loans
Funding:	Allocations of bond-issuing authority allow bond financing at lower, tax-exempt rates for projects that would otherwise be taxable private activities (for example, projects benefitting for-profit businesses or involving public/private partnerships). State law divides the state's total bond cap by percentage among the eligible project types, and provides guidance for estimating the public value of private projects and prioritizing allocations.
